HB61 & SB132: Transgender Athlete Bans

The "Save Women's Sports Act" Summary:

- Bans youth athletes (K -12, State Institutions of Higher Ed.) from playing on the team that aligns with their gender identity rather than their sex assigned at birth.
- Directly attacks Ohio High School
 Athletic Association and NCAA's
 policies on providing an inclusive
 environment for transgender athletes.
- Sponsors: Reps. Jena Powell & Reggie Stoltzfus, Senator Kristina Roegner

What are the current OHSAA policies?

- In the state of Ohio , transgender girls can play on a girls team if they show they have completed at least one year of hormone replacement therapy.
- In fact, OHSAA has made just 48
 transgender rulings in the past 5 years,
 including 11 transgender female approvals.
 The OHSAA denied two students because they didn't supply all the necessary paperwork and medical information to allow officials to make an informed decision.



The Ohio Legislature 101

Ohio is currently in its 134th legislative session. Each session lasts two years (each state is different) and aides/staff are around all year long.

There are two chambers: The House and Senate.

- You can start to better understand the legislative process by first finding your lawm akers. You can find your Ohio
 Senator and Representative here:
- Representatives and Senators *sponsor* bills in both chambers, and often introduce the same bill on both sides to move it forward (companion bills).
 - For example: HB (House Bill) 61 and SB (Senate Bill) 132 are the same bill in different chambers.





The Ohio Legislature 101

Next, you can get an idea of what standing committees there are and what committee the bill you're interested in is currently in.

- o <u>House</u>
- o <u>Senate</u>

What is a standing committee?

A com mittee is a key part of the legislative process where lawmakers can discuss, amend, and vote on a bill in a smaller setting before it's voted through the legislature.

Your involvement is crucial throughout this process, but the majority of public involvement happens when a bill is in committee and in independent outreach from constituents. You can help with both of these parts.

For example: HB61 and SB132 are both assigned to committees:

House Primary and Secondary Education

Senate Workforce and Higher Education



How the Timeline Works:

Finding a Sponsor

Finding someone to introduce your idea (You want support from both parties)

Committee Hearing

After

Testimony on bill in committee (4-5 hearings)

*A bill must be given a 1st hearing

Before

Writing the Bill

Getting a Sponsor, Cosponsor, etc. Bipartisan is always best!

Bill is Introduced

The bill is actually assigned a number, Introduced in committee by a sponsor(s)

Floor Votes

Repeat on the other side once passed

(Two Year Terms!)
